The East Daily Bridge carries County Route 21 over Tygart Valley River and is located approximately 0.58 miles south of US 219. The bridge was built in 1938 by the Camp Tygart Civilian Conservation Corp to replace a submarine bridge and is a contributing structure to the Tygart Valley Homesteads Historic District. It is eligible for the National Register of Historic Properties for its association with the CCC and the Tygart Valley Homesteads Historic District. East Daily Bridge consists of 3 steel wide flange beam spans supported by concrete abutments and piers. It is 203 feet 6 inches long with a 16 foot roadway width. This bridge is scheduled for replacement in 2018.

The Tygart Valley Homesteads Historic District was a resettlement community established during the Great Depression. It is approximately 1,500 acres in size and has four areas of significance: community planning and development, politics/government, social history, and agriculture. It also has a significant association with Eleanor Roosevelt and Benjamin Smith, an architect.
